Dear	 ,

For the past several weeks, you have gradually been making the transition from elementary school to middle school. This is a very important time in your life, as you begin making decisions which will impact and affect your young adulthood and ultimately your transition into manhood. You are now entering a phase in your life, wherein the foundation of personal choices and decisions that you make today will largely shape the man who you will soon become, and they will determine whether or not you live a life of integrity and honor, going forward. Right now...today...yes, this very moment is the time for you to begin thinking about the kind of man that you want to become, and to begin taking on some of the responsibilities of manhood. The purpose of this letter is my attempt to share with you several of the things, I believe, you need to know, as your father. Ponder the following quote from Henry Ward Beecher:

"An acorn is not an oak when it is sprouted. It must go through long summers and fierce winters, and endure all that frost and snow, and thunder, and storms, and side-striking winds can bring, before it is a full grown oak. So a man is not a man when he is created; he is only begun. His manhood must come with years. He who goes through life prosperous, and comes to his grave without a wrinkle, is not half a man. Difficulties are God's errands and trainers, and only through them can one come to fullness of manhood." —Henry Ward Beecher

What does it mean to be a man in today's world? Well, unfortunately, there is an abundance of poor examples in this world which provide a distorted view of manhood. Just look around you. Is a young person, such as yourself, supposed to take their cue from today's politicians, celebrities, professional athletes, musicians, actors, and/or the media? From the perspective of some of today's rap artists, here are a few examples of what a distorted view of manhood looks like:

Really? Even within G-rated family movies, one's perspective on manhood may become skewed. Gaston, the self-absorbed egotistical hunter in the Disney movie, "Beauty and the Beast", who vies for Belle's hand in marriage, is another example of how true manhood is often misportrayed. What, then, are the lasting qualities, values and virtues that distinguish a man from a boy and best define manhood? As a young man, what are some of the character traits that I am expecting you to embrace as you seek out manhood and learn what it means to become a good friend, student, neighbor, citizen, husband, and/or father some day?

Perhaps, the following examples written by Todd Wagner (Pastor of Watermark Community Church in Dallas, Texas) are a good place to start. For now, just as an overview, focus primarily on the 5 characteristics of a godly man which are highlighted in **bold print**:

[&]quot;Manhood is 100% ego." -Kanye West

[&]quot;Manhood is being a thug – and surviving it." **–50 Cent**

Five Characteristics of a Godly Man - by Todd Wagner

1. <u>STEP UP</u>: Lead. Initiate. Be a man of action. Assume it is your job and your moment. Hate apathy. Reject passivity.

When David heard of it, he sent Joab and all the army, the mighty men..."Be strong, and let us show ourselves courageous for the sake of our people and for the cities of our God; and may the LORD do what is good in His sight." -2 Samuel 10:7,12

"I searched for a man among them who would build up the wall and stand in the gap before Me for the land, so that I would not destroy it; but I found no one." – Ezekiel 22:30

2. <u>SPEAK OUT</u>: Silence in the midst of sin is a sin. Be courageous. Fear God not man. Speak the truth in love.

Better is open rebuke than love that is concealed. Faithful are the wounds of a friend, But deceitful are the kisses of an enemy. – Proverbs 27:5-6

Open your mouth for the mute, for the rights of all the unfortunate. Open your mouth, judge righteously, and defend the rights of the afflicted and needy. – Proverbs 31:8-9

3. STAND STRONG: Don't give in when you are challenged, attacked or criticized.

"Now behold, I have made you today as a fortified city and as a pillar of iron and as walls of bronze against the whole land, to the kings of Judah, to its princes, to its priests and to the people of the land. They will fight against you, but they will not overcome you, for I am with you to deliver you," declares the LORD. – Jeremiah 1:18-19

Therefore, my beloved brethren, be steadfast, immovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, knowing that your toil is not in vain in the Lord. – I Corinthians 15:58

Be of sober spirit, be on the alert. Your adversary, the devil, prowls around like a roaring lion, seeking someone to devour. But resist him, firm in your faith, knowing that the same experiences of suffering are being accomplished by your brethren who are in the world. -1 Peter 5:8-9

4. <u>STAY HUMBLE</u>: Be vigilant against pride. Get the log out of your eye. Don't think less of yourself, think of yourself less.

Let the righteous smite me in kindness and reprove me; It is oil upon the head; Do not let my head refuse it, for still my prayer is against their wicked deeds. – Psalm 141:5

You younger men, likewise, be subject to your elders; and all of you, clothe yourselves with humility toward one another, for GOD IS OPPOSED TO THE PROUD, BUT GIVES GRACE TO THE HUMBLE. Therefore humble yourselves under the mighty hand of God, that He may exalt you at the proper time, casting all your anxiety on Him, because He cares for you. – 1 Peter 5:5-7

5. <u>SERVE THE KING</u>: Seek first His Kingdom, His glory, His righteousness. Hope in the eternal. Live for a greater reward.

For even the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve, and to give His life a ransom for many." – Mark 10:45

No doubt, you will face a number of challenges and responsibilities over the next several years and throughout your lifetime, and so I pray that your faith in God will always continue to serve as the foundation to your personal character. As your dad, I expect for you to grow into a young man who demonstrates the highest of character, honor, integrity, morals and principles -- in all of the areas and relationships of your life. By the time that you graduate from high school and leave home for college, you will need to have learned how to be responsible for yourself, and to be ready and well-equipped to take on the world, all on your own. With more freedom and independence, for sure, comes greater responsibility and obligations. Over the next several years, as you enter high school, college and as you go out into the world, I look forward to you taking on certain qualities and traits, and steadily building on them over time.

In the days ahead, XXXXX, I encourage you to always strive to conduct yourself with honesty and integrity, to be diligent in your work, to learn how to be thankful and content with what you have, to give more than you take, to be inclusive, to encourage others, to forgive everyone, to defend the defenseless, to practice daily random acts of kindness, to communicate your love for

others, to listen more fully, talk less, and respond with a soft answer (more often than not), to treasure the simplicity of everyday moments, to laugh/sing/dance each day, to honor your body (since it is the only one that you have), to spend more time improving your character than you do improving your appearance, to keep God's word close to your heart and, above all else, to pray without ceasing. A godly man keeps his heart pure, keeps his mind sharp, shows integrity, uses his words wisely, works hard, devotes himself to God, never gives up easily, and gives of himself to others without complaining. I challenge you to be the man who steps up, who speaks out, who stands strong, who stays humble and who loves and serves God at all times.

No doubt, XXXXX, you will make mistakes along the way and fall short of your God-given potential. This is true for all of us. There will be times when you will not only disappoint those around you, but even more so, you are likely to disappoint yourself at times. Remember, that it is not the individual mistakes we make, themselves, but what we do with these mistakes that sets us apart. When you do face seemingly insurmountable challenges, difficulty and failure ahead, I encourage you to re-open this letter and once again read what I have tried to outline here for you.

Also, simply being male does not, in and of itself, guarantee that you will grow up to be a gentleman. For a boy to become a man (and ultimately a gentleman), is an ongoing process -- this is a marathon, buddy, not a sprint! The following examples, written by Deborah King, are also worth considering, as you ponder what it means to enter manhood and become a gentleman:

10 Traits of a Gentleman – by Deborah King

- 1. A gentleman is generous with his time, wisdom, and resources. He willingly serves others and extends a hand to those in need.
- 2. A gentleman possesses a positive outlook on life. His humor and consistent encouragement attract others to him.
- 3. A gentleman is a lifelong learner. He maintains a teachable posture and embraces change for the better.
- 4. A gentleman models civility in how he treats others. He demonstrates respect, restraint, and personal responsibility in all his interactions. He is honorable, and values and respects others.
- 5. A gentleman is well-mannered and knows what is appropriate. He is able to navigate various social and professional settings with ease and proficiency. He embraces all people those from other cultures, as well as individuals from various social and economic backgrounds.
- 6. A gentleman possesses a strong work ethic. He takes pride in his labor and strives to give his very best. He is trustworthy, loyal, and people speak well of him.

- 7. A gentleman is confident. His posture and body language communicate a strong personal presence.
- 8. A gentleman is well-dressed. He knows how to select clothing that is appropriate for any occasion and that will assist him in accomplishing his goals. He is well-groomed and practices good hygiene. He understands that his personal appearance the way he chooses to dress, groom, and carry himself opens doors to new opportunities.
- 9. A gentleman is well-spoken and a generous listener. He knows how to effectively connect with others and communicate his message.
- 10. A gentleman is known for his integrity. He is a man of his word and follows through with his commitments, whatever the cost. His actions reflect who he has chosen to be and are not based upon the opinions of others.

XXXX, sometime, when you are on the MBA campus and have a little extra time on your hands, take the opportunity to read any of the many quotes posted in the hallways and on the placards of many of the buildings, and the countless inspiring words that are etched in stone throughout the campus.
